Description of the subject: a brief but informative description of the knowledge to be acquired

An exploration of the ethical dilemmas that arise in the daily practice of social work, or remain hidden.

The aim is to enable students to recognise situations where two core values are in conflict, creating ethical dilemmas in their work, and to deal with these situations in the most appropriate way.

A further aim is to develop professional personality and to recognise the importance of recognising and working with prejudices.

We will focus on the ethical dilemmas that arise in our daily professional work, and on articles and professional material from the literature - in the form of seminars.

The final session of the course will focus on developing skills and professional identity in a safe environment.
