Description of the subject: a brief but informative description of the knowledge to be acquired

The aim of this course is to provide students with a basic theoretical and practical knowledge of community social work. By the end of the course, students will understand macro-level intervention and be able to design a community project after mapping a social problem.

The student will be trained in the theoretical trends and practical methods of community social work, with a special focus on community work practice in the home country. Be able to recognise the principles of community organisation and to examine them in the context of current social conditions.

In the course, students will learn techniques of community mapping, community needs assessment, community development, community organizing, service planning, and community advocacy.
